; ) We now live in an *EMOTICON* culture. If you, like my computer, are not emoticon savvy you may think the two punctuation marks at the beginning of this page are a typo and not a winking smiley face meant to alert you that the text beside it should be read as a wry statement.

Emoticons (a multiplying number of "smileys" or punctuation facsimiles) and abbreviations like LOL (laughing out loud) are cues given along with text to explain how something should be read. They are necessitated by the increasingly abbreviated phrases of our texting/smart phone culture. In our messages we need some way to indicate in what spirit a text is to be read. Not writing LOL after a text or email meant to be funny could cost you dearly in the offense taken at a message meant to be laughed at.

The need for emotional cues to aid in getting across our intended meaning in a written text is also needful because so much of that meaning, in our spoken communication, is carried through non-verbal means. The tone of the words we speak, their emphasis and articulation in addition to our body language and facial expressions are usually more important than the actual words we speak. These are not easily communicated in a written text so, increasingly in emails and text messaging, they have to be supplied. It is very like the kind of notations which occur around a musical staff which tell a musician how the composer intends the notes to be interpreted.

It occurred to me during our local Lenten *Bread, Bowl and Bible* study that it might be nice to have an *Emoticon Bible*. The study leader was discussing biblical storytelling and describing the significant variations of interpretation possible simply by which words the teller emphasizes in a sentence. Sometimes it isn't even the words themselves, but the pauses

between words which makes all the difference. Additionally, one's expression and verbal tone, not to mention volume, surround the words with meaning. Some such cues or even emoticons in the Bible text itself might really help clarify just how a biblical writer intended us to read some of the Bible's more inexplicable passages.

Of course, even if the emoticons were in the original Hebrew and Greek texts I am sure there would be "variant" emoticons in different biblical manuscripts and possibly an entire field of biblical scholarship devoted to the study of the original historical emoticons and their principle semiotic domains. But that aside, wouldn't it be great if Paul had supplied a couple of emoticons in his letters to help us confidently interpret the spirit of the text? A few LOLs in Paul would go a long way toward making some of the apostle's confounding writings more comprehensible.

The specific text I was listening to when I started thinking about this was the text we will hear on Easter morning, Mark 16:1-8. Rev. Paul Lutz, the lead presenter for our Lenten bible study, was describing a biblical storyteller, *Tracy Radosevic* presenting this text. (You can see this presentation at [www.youtube.com/watch?v=f2vRS7TO1ng](http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=f2vRS7TO1ng)) The text begins by describing the women coming to the tomb and then the words, "And very early on the first day of the week, when the sun had risen..." Then she paused and gave a great big wink ; ). In that pause and wink I realized something I had never noticed in this text I had read dozens of times, the symbolism of the "sun rise" at the site of the "Sun-rise." Clearly, Mark intended this to be a powerful symbol, and before that wink ; ) I had never noticed it. Immediately I thought, "Gosh, what else am I missing!" Probably a lot...*LOL*.

I am sure that the Bible is full of texts misread and misunderstood by slow folks like me who sometimes like to imagine we know it all. This is one way to look at it. A more positive spin is this, the Scriptures have the wonderful capacity to be a gift that keeps on giving. There is always more to their great store of wisdom and inspiration. But to receive this we have to be open to the recognition that these texts cannot be read as simple two dimensional words, straight forward, eminently simple characters on a page. Instead there is a wealth of meaning and material around the words which, without the benefit of emoticons and other cues, can only be discovered through the interpretation of phrasing,

pauses and emphasis. Without this the two dimensional text hardly speaks adequately in our three dimensional world. Doing this interpretation as a community is one of the essential purposes of the church.

So an edifying exercise in your own biblical interpretation might be the thought, "What emoticons would I insert beside a particular biblical text to make its *spirit* more comprehensible?" Where would the smileys go? Frowns? Winks? Should there be any LOLs anywhere? Where should the pauses be? What happens if I emphasize one word over another? Have I ever considered what a text might mean if read in a different emotional tone than the way I've always heard it or imagined it in my mind?

When we do this we recognize the living and active nature of God's Word in Holy Scripture and endeavor to set that Word free from the text with all the fullness of its intention, emotion and power.

I hope that at the sun rise ; ) of the day of the Son's rise you may hear anew the good news of God's promise of love and redemption for you in the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. And may the Spirit of God enliven our reading of the Scriptures, warm our hearts as we hear them read, and animate us to share the good and gracious news in all that we say and do.

### **A NOTE FROM CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COORDINATOR.....**

During this Lenten season we have been taking a look at 7 faith practices. We studied prayer (oriented toward God), worship (seeking God's presence), sacraments (a tapestry of traditions), giving (the joy of sharing), service (the needs right around you), and community (an unexpected family) during our six-week course. But that only counts to 6. What happen to the 7th faith practice? The 7th practice is food (eating, with Jesus). We actually did practice it every week with soup and bread and communion services during this season.

Jewish friends practice their faith with a Passover Seder meal. This meal provides a family and community setting for storytelling about the faith, symbolism of foods, and the joy of gathering together and having some fun with each other.

The course material we used—Animate series, Practices—emphasized in this practice the temptation to idolize food. The writer suggests "that the abundance of good food can be as bad for your soul as the scarcity

of food.” What do you think she meant with that? That statement and question would have been a part of our Wednesday evening study.

Jesus broke several laws mentioned in the Old Testament which outline what to eat or not to eat, specific instructions on how to prepare food, when to eat, and with whom to eat. What rules do you have about what to eat, how to prepare, when to eat, and with whom do you eat food? Do you have some restrictions?

Food is a part of our relational practices. Jesus set an example breaking bread with people the laws told him to stay away from. We may not be eating our special celebration meal with socially unacceptable people. Some family gatherings may be uncomfortable as we deal with different personalities and the relationships we have with them. You may find yourself eating with people you don’t normally share food practice with. These occasions are times to practice our faith of being kind to one another, serve on another, listen to one another, and share with one another. They are also a time to extend an invitation to someone who may be normally eating alone.

So when was the last really good meal you had? May it be the one that is a part of your family Easter celebration. Remember that we have this special feast day to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus. May your family take time on Easter to acknowledge that Jesus is present with you at this great meal. Just as we remember each time we receive communion that Jesus is present with us and our extended family around the world and those dwelling in the very presence in the kingdom of God.

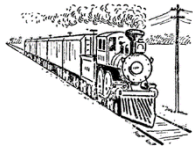
