BE THAT GUY

So you're in line at the grocery store and the guy in front of you suddenly bolts to the other end of the store to retrieve an item he forgot. He's gone a while. The rest of the people in line flash annoyed glances at one another as you stand there awaiting his return. When you reach the checker you realize that you have forgotten one of the principal items you came to the store to get. What do you do? If my kids were with me and I bounced it off them I know what they would say, "Don't be...that guy!" "That guy" is the guy (or gal) who does the thing you wouldn't do. When people today find themselves contemplating an action they consistently criticize others for it is brought to their attention by someone saying, "Don't be that guy..."

So, okay, nobody wants to be that guy, but is there another guy? The guy (or gal) who consistently does the thing you wish you would do? The one who makes the right choices and enhances rather than diminishes the lives of those around them? Could we possibly be "that guy"? Here is your chance to be "that guy" "that other guy."

You could not have missed hearing or reading in the news about the massive refugee crisis in eastern and central Europe propelled by the increasing unrest in Syria and the Middle East. It doesn't take much imagination to understand why these people are fleeing. It also doesn't take much imagination to picture what a monumental humanitarian crisis this is. The pictures of families desperately seeking a place to live

where they and their children are not subject to the horrific violence of the radicalized fundamentalist Islamists groups are heartbreaking.

You may not realize this but you may already be helping these refugee families. St. Paul's has a long association with Church World Service. We participate in the annual Crop Walk, Blanket Sunday, health kits, etc. One of the principal ministries of Church World Service is refugee services. In fact 56% of their total budget is spent on helping displaced persons. Last year that amounted to over \$45 million dollars. Church World Service and other humanitarian organizations are already working with refugees from Syria and elsewhere to help during this time of crisis. And they are drawing on resources such as blankets and health kits already in their inventory to do so. But of course, the scale of this need will demand much more.

Perhaps it is only a coincidence that the Crop Walk, a major source of funding for Church World Service, is about to take place around the country on the second Sunday of October. Or maybe this is our special opportunity to be one of those people that does the thing most needed at just the right time to make the lives of people around them better. Yeah...that guy!

Our community Crop Walk is taking place at the Daniel Boone Homestead on October 11th at 1:30 PM. Money raised from our walk will directly benefit refugees presently fleeing Isis incursions in the Middle East.

Is this something you wish you could do something about? Would you like to shake off the feeling of being a helpless observer of this tragedy? If so then...be that guy. Be the help and change you want to make happen by participating in the Crop Walk or sponsoring a walker. We are not condemned to simply standing aside, helpless, unable to participate in the relief of suffering around the world and in our own neighborhoods. We can step in and make a difference. Remember also that 25% of all money raised is returned to our local community and forms the principal resource for emergency aid to families right here.

Our Christian faith holds at its center someone who self-identified with the neediest folk in the world (yeah...*that Guy!*) The Crop Walk is a substantial opportunity to step out and make a difference, to stand in

solidarity on behalf of those who suffer with our Lord Jesus Christ. The circumstances of our world require us to step up and make a difference. Don't miss your opportunity to be... "THAT GUY!"

A NEW REFORMATION?

October 31st 2015 marks the 498th anniversary of the beginning of the Protestant Reformation. 2017 is the biggie...500 years. Church historians note that major changes in the church seem to occur every 500 years. The Protestant Reformation (1517 ff), the Great Schism between the western Roman and eastern Orthodox churches (1095), the Gregorian Reforms (590). Church historian Phyllis Tickle wrote that every 500 years the church has a rummage sale. No one can doubt that great changes are happening in the church. Extensive research confirms it. Is the Christian Church beginning one of these "rummage sales?" Is it a crisis or a new reformation (or both)? We will explore these questions and share a light supper.



ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL WITH PASTOR.....

The Adult Study Group will continue through December to explore spiritual questions and practices with two leading contemporary Christian authors, Diana Butler Bass and Richard Rohr. Meet in the library during Sunday school at 9:15.
