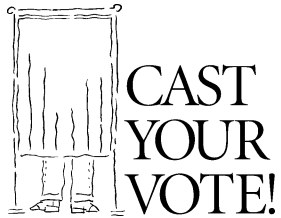

The presidential campaign, which has been in full swing since about 2012, continues to lead the headlines and airwaves in Pennsylvania. Churches do well to steer clear of partisan involvement not simply because such entanglement threatens their non-profit tax status but because the church needs to maintain its independent voice to advocate for principles consistent with the life and teaching of Jesus.

That being said, Christians do have an historic responsibility to be engaged in political processes in as much as they represent the interests of ourselves and our neighbors. Although some Christian groups have avoided political participations, such a stance is out of line with Biblical direction and historic church tradition. Jesus and Paul acknowledged the legitimacy of political authority and the responsibility Christians have to obey and support it. Also, early Christian writings such as Justin Martyr's *First Apology* (concerning the faith of the Church), which was written around 155 CE during state persecution of Christian leaders, refuted allegations against Christians including the charge that Christians were disloyal citizens of the earthly state.

In our own tradition, Martin Luther was adamant that God governed this world through the apparatus of earthly governments and Christians were expected to support and obey these earthly authorities. This created real problems for Lutherans in Nazi Germany, since they believed God would work through any duly instituted government and expected, early on anyway, that this would include Hitler's administration. Despite the tragedy of the Third Reich, Lutherans continued to expect God to work through earthly governmental leaders

and encouraged people to participate in God's work through these individuals.

Our Lutheran heritage is one of a faith that engages political life as an outside yet highly interested voice. (Peter Muhlenberg, son of American Lutheran patriarch Henry Melchior Muhlenberg, was a Revolutionary War general and the first Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives) The church should not tell people how to vote or for whom to vote. But Christians are called to be a prophetic voice which bears witness to God's activity and intentions for God's people. A faithful Lutheran prays for the nation and world and consults the Bible and particularly the life and teachings of Jesus for guidance on political choices.

So I encourage you, as a Christian, to stay engaged in the political discussion and the conversation of the truly consequential issues before us and the candidates for office in 2016. And when the time comes, participate in that process by choosing public servants through whom you believe the principles of Jesus might best be realized. This is not only your duty as a responsible citizen but as a faithful Christian who acknowledges God's institution of and work through civil authorities.

...might be something advertised to get people's attention, but we know you do not need such enticements to pay close attention to an important announcement.

There will be a change this summer to the lectionary lessons read on Sundays in church. We follow the three year common lectionary of Sunday readings used by most mainline Protestant and Roman Catholic churches. Within that lectionary an alternative set of Old Testament readings may be selected which, rather than being paired with the gospel reading, follows a theme through the Old Testament in the season of Pentecost (May-Nov). We are going to follow this "semi-continuous" reading series in Pentecost for the next three years. The second lesson and the gospel reading will not be affected.

The benefits of this semi-continuous reading are at least two-fold. One, we get to look in more depth at an important Old Testament theme (In

year C, which we are in now, the theme is prophecy). Two, we are exposed to some readings from the Old Testament not normally read in church in the standard lectionary.

Because these Old Testament readings are not available for users of the *Celebrate* bulletin insert, we are going to try going without that insert over the summer and see how that goes. We can always bring it back if it is greatly missed.

Another change we would like to make is to produce less bulletins each week. Since the bulletins are the same for both the 8 and 10:30 AM services we will have a box out where 8:00 AM worshippers can deposit their bulletins if they do not wish to take them home. These bulletins can be reused at the 10:30 AM service. This is not so much an economic as an ecologic decision. We want to be good stewards of God's resources!



ADULT STUDY: Summer Preview

Monday May 16th Supper at 6:00 PM – Study at 7:00 PM

This summer we will begin using the semi-continuous Old Testament reading option during the season of Pentecost. These readings follow themes in the Old Testament: (Year A) Major Genesis narratives, the covenant with Moses, and the establishment of Israel in the Promised Land; (Year B) Covenant of David and Wisdom literature; (Year C) Prophetic proclamation chosen in chronological order and highlighting Jeremiah. We are in Year C and in the Adult Study I will give a preview of the lessons and have some conversation about the role and message of the prophets.
