Sunday, September 11, 2016 marks the 15th anniversary of the attacks on American cities by terrorists of the al-Qaeda network which killed and injured thousands and was, undoubtedly, *the* definitional event of early 21st century American history.

Many articles exist and will be written in anticipation of this 15th anniversary of 9/11 analyzing what this calamity has meant and how it has effected Americans and people around the world. The cultural, emotional, economic, etc. costs are almost incalculable though we are still trying to assess their effects.

A clearly positive effect of the attacks has been our greater appreciation of the first responding fire, police and health professionals who put themselves in harm's way in order to protect us in a great variety of situations. These professionals and often volunteers deserve not only our appreciation but also our support, moral and financial, as they carry out sometimes difficult, sometimes tedious, always important daily tasks to preserve public safety. But overshadowing this positive good is the bitter legacy of September 11th, the specter of deep fear which suffuses our society.

Our worries are not unjustified and fear is certainly nothing new. I grew up amid deep Cold War fears of nuclear annihilation. But the anxiety engendered by the devastating attacks in New York and Washington (and the downed plane in PA) seemed so profoundly personal and dangerous in a way that generalized fears of nuclear attack simply weren't. Terrorism was not, by any means, a new thing but it was something that was now happening in our own backyard.

Further, it was not just the proximity of the violence that has made this particular fear so crippling, it is its murky randomness. It is the unseen, lurking, seemingly arbitrary threat that we have the most trouble managing emotionally. It is like the shark in *Jaws* which lurks, unseen for 1 hour and 21 minutes of the 2 hour film. The "phantom menace" makes the shark just that much more frightening.

In the destabilized regions of Northern Iraq, and more recently Syria, the rise of the "Islamic State" has perpetuated the terror inherent in arbitrary attacks around the world and in the United States. These attacks have heightened our already acute anxiety and forced us to question some of the core principles of our society including our stance toward immigrants and the free exercise of religion.

It does not trouble me that these issues are up for discussion. As someone interested in American history I recognize that these matters have been on the table since the beginning. What worries me is the fear and anxiety coloring much of the conversation. For it is fundamental that we human beings do not reason well in the midst of fear. The "fear factor" behind our national consciousness has been the most damaging legacy of 9/11 and the subsequent terrorist attacks. And I have to admit that part of what bothers me most about this is that fear and destabilization are precisely what the terrorists have been aiming for.

The more anxious we are the more our decisions and responses will be driven by the response to our fears and not by our best judgments. Brain studies have found that fear easily overwhelms dispassionate reason. Fear keeps us alive, but fearful decision-making sometimes (often) makes mistakes...mistakes that creates new risks, and imposes new and extensive societal, moral and financial costs. Fear may not be the only thing we have to fear but it is the thing which, ultimately, poses the most danger to our society and to our faith.

Perhaps it is for this reason that encouraging people not to fear is one of the most common themes in the Bible. I've read that the phrase "fear not" occurs 365 times in the Bible. That would make a great sermon if it were true, but it isn't. But the phrase "fear not" or something equivalent appears, by my reckoning, over 80 times in the Old and New Testaments. That's a lot...the 365 hyperbole is unnecessary. This tells

me that fear is not a new problem. It also tells me that God recognizes the serious danger fear poses for us human beings.

Jesus spent a lot of time encouraging, almost begging his disciples not to be afraid. In the end his encouragement takes on the force of commandment, “Do not be afraid!” It was not only because he wanted to spare disciples the pain of acute anxiety that Jesus issued this command. Jesus clearly recognized the difficulty of maintaining a generous, faithful spirit while in the grip of fear and anxiety. The outstretched arms accompanying the Gospel are literally pulled in by the protective posture invoked by fear. Self-protection in the mist of fear is a natural part of the survival instinct but it is antithetical to the *Good News* disciples are to bear in word and deed.

Jesus’ command (and it is a command) not to fear is more than a concern for our feelings, it is a recognition that we cannot possibly be effective disciples of the love of God if our lives are overshadowed by fear.

Jesus challenged the fears of the disciples by revealing that the things they were afraid of were not as scary as they thought. He challenged the “reasonableness” of their anxieties saying things like “consider the birds...consider the lilies of the field” God takes care of them, how much more will God take care of you. Jesus did not simply point out fear or command people not to be afraid, he gave justification for courage. GOD IS IN CHARGE. GOD’S WILL WILL PREVAIL!

This is especially good news for our anxiety about the future. Terrorists can do a lot of harm, but they cannot prevail, for God’s will is for peace and God’s will WILL prevail. We would do well to remember that. It is for us then to best consider how to participate with God’s will for peace in such a way as to facilitate its being brought about. To do this we must not be afraid; fear will ultimately lead us away from God’s will.

To be good disciples we need to take on Jesus’ command to not be afraid so that we might adequately, even effectively witness to God’s love and forgiveness in Jesus. This is made plain in the Bible, if not 365 times, more than 80.

But this is also a good example of a place where what’s good for our discipleship and our citizenship intersect. I believe in light of the 15th anniversary of the attacks on 9/11/2001 that our most effective counter to terror and terrorists is to challenge their power to make us afraid and not let them force us to make decisions based on fear. Terrorists have demonstrated they do not fear and indeed embrace death. People of faith and hope must prove that we do not fear and in fact embrace the things of life.

I imagine the surest way to foil terror and terrorists is to resist fear and defy the bloodshed, hatred and disorientation which is a terrorist’s stock and trade. To do this we must take deeply into ourselves Jesus’ injunction not to fear.

I hope our observance of the 15th anniversary of the terror attacks of September 11th 2001 will be an opportunity to defy terror in all its forms as the devil’s own work and commit ourselves wholly (holy) to Jesus’ words, “Be not afraid.” May his command penetrate our hearts, made so defensive by the threats we find around us, and enable us to defy those who would cripple us with fear and give us the courage to continue witnessing to the goodness and peace of God in Jesus Christ!

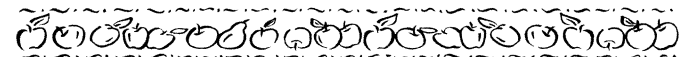
