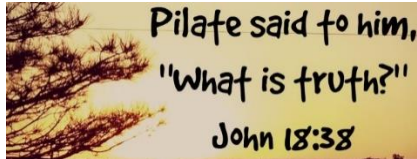

Pilate asked him, "So you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice." Pilate asked him, "What is truth?" (John 18:37-38)

In the beginning of December a woman from Tampa Florida was arrested for sending threatening email messages to a man named Lenny Pozner. The threats, which included messages such as, "You gonna die" and "Death is coming to you real soon" made a difficult time of year for Mr Pozner even harder. Lenny Pozner is not a Florida native. He relocated there from Newtown Connecticut. On December 14, 2012 Mr Pozner's son Noah was the youngest of 20 children shot and killed at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown Connecticut by the deeply disturbed gunman Adam Lanza. The woman who threatened Pozner's life did so because she believes that the Sandy Hook School shooting is a hoax and that Lenny Ponzer's son probably never even existed.

57 year old Lucy Richards, facing four counts of transmitting threats in interstate commerce, is not alone in her belief that the Newtown massacre is a hoax. There is an alarmingly large community of people who believe the massacre at Sandy Hook Elementary School was staged: by the Obama administration using actors to advance gun control legislation, or by agents of Israel as a psy op, or as a cover up by an international banking cabal, or...

Since the death of his son and the growth of the Sandy Hook conspiracy theories, Lenny Pozner has dedicated a significant portion of his time to unmasking various conspiracy theories. (Many of the theories and theorists are interconnected and presented on online platforms such as

Infowars). In his interaction with the Sandy Hook conspiracy theorists he has repeatedly been asked to produce certified documentation (such as a birth certificate) to prove the very existence of his son Noah. Mr. Pozner's push back on the conspiracy theorists and his refusal to be silent about his son's murder precipitated the threats against his life.

One of the big stories of 2016 was the proliferation of so called, "fake news." Fake news is not editorial or speculative news. It is not information which later proves to be incorrect due to the rush to transmit news stories before the facts come in. It is not even shoddy reporting. Fake news is pure fabrication and utter nonsense. Fake news is produced with the full knowledge of the writer that it is false but it is published, usually online, as if it were true. This fake news has also found its way onto social media platforms, most notably Facebook, and through programing (bots) is able to appear more credible by associating itself with vast readerships and various reputable news sources.

Fake news works because it appeals to ideas, biases and ideologies already accepted by its readers. There is a phenomenon in the way all humans collect and process information which psychologists call confirmation bias. Confirmation bias is the tendency for people to listen to ideas, read or watch programs and collect information that amplifies and supports opinions and attitudes already held. In other words, we listen to information that reinforces what we already believe and reject information that counters our opinions. This bias is inherent in the way we think and feel. We receive complementary information with pleasure and contradictory information causes actual, physical revulsion and pain.

The ingrained propensity to confirmation bias can be checked by: not restricting our exposure to information only to sources which we know in advance will simply reinforce what we already think, engaging in respectful conversation with people holding views contrary to ours and by questioning and updating our opinions and attitudes. Varying of the sources of our information and WIDELY probing the veracity of that information is important if we are ever to arrive at anything resembling truth.

But therein lies another problem. As Pontius Pilate asked, “What is truth?” There seems to be less agreement today than at any time I can recall over the existence of verifiable truth or even fact. Regardless of the quality and quantity of evidence, its verification, whether its scrutinized in a process such as peer review, or the clear consensus of those in a position to know something about a subject, today someone need only assert their refusal to believe it and that serves as justification for doubt.

To say I find this troubling would be the understatement of the year. I have no difficulty with people taking a controversial issue and debating its merits or meaning. But the base denial of clearly established and verified facts is not deliberation, it is mere petulance. If all facts are merely a matter of preference and opinion then truth is nothing more than an extension of our own personal reality. Each person’s set of facts may (or may not) extend to those who happen to agree with them and all facts not supporting that truth are simply discarded as if they did not even exist (like Noah Pozner).

The theological implications of this descent into complete and utter factual relativism are staggering. Christianity is based on faith. *Faith*, as the writer of Hebrews defines it “*is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. (Heb. 11:1)* The most important elements of our faith cannot be verified with evidence or fact. We cannot produce evidence that God came to earth in the person of Jesus, or that Jesus rose from the dead in order to make us a part of his resurrected life.

But faith is also based upon facts such as the fact that Jesus of Nazareth was a real person who died on a cross. There is as much historical and verifiable evidence for the existence of Jesus as there is for someone like Julius Caesar or Alexander the Great. We have testimony to Jesus’ life not only from his friends but also from his enemies. Roman antagonists such as the historians Tacitus (58-117 AD), Suetonius (died 54 AD) and the Jewish turned Roman leader Josephus (37-100 AD) all testify to Jesus’ real existence. They also agree that he gathered followers and was crucified by the Romans.

Such testimony has always been considered to be established fact testifying to the genuine existence of Jesus. But in a world where one

person’s facts are as good as another’s, do such facts mean anything at all? If not, our faith rests on a very thin reed indeed. As people of faith we should care about whether anything in this world, including the existence of Jesus, can really be claimed as fact. The implications of facts are certainly subject to thoughtful debate and the impress of opinion. But to treat all fact as relative conjecture signals the end of useful discourse and perhaps the veracity of a historical Jesus. When receiving evidence claimed as fact we should weigh it and investigate it and consider alternatives to it, but God save us from relativizing it by simply rejecting it because it is disagreeable or inconvenient.

I believe there is something at stake for Christians in defending against a world where nothing can be known for certain and truth is only what any one of us is willing to believe. Christians of good will stand on many sides of many different issues but we must all stand against the relativization of facts, the contempt for evidence and the summary dismissal of proofs.

Christians also bear responsibility for countering false and malicious fake news. In his explanation of faithful obedience to the eighth commandment Martin Luther characterized this obedience in a way you might remember from your catechetical days, “YOU SHALL NOT BEAR FALSE WITNESS AGAINST YOUR NEIGHBOR. *WHAT DOES THIS MEAN? WE SHOULD FEAR AND LOVE GOD SO THAT WE DO NOT MISREPRESENT, BETRAY, SLANDER, OR DEFAME OUR NEIGHBOR, BUT DEFEND HIM, SPEAK WELL OF HIM, AND PUT THE BEST CONSTRUCTION ON EVERYTHING.* (SMALL CATECHISM)

With the continued development of information platforms, and the increasing ease of propagating fake and often malevolent, fictitious information, Christians need to take a stand for truth and face the sometimes difficult reality of fact. For somewhere in those facts is the voice of Jesus bidding us to stand up for what we believe he has called us to be about, the truth for which Jesus (definitely) came into the world.
