Just then a lawyer stood up to test Jesus. 'Teacher,' he said, 'what must I do to inherit eternal life?' He said to him, 'What is written in the law? What do you read there?' He answered, 'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself.' And he said to him, 'You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live.' But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, 'And who is my neighbor?' (Luke 10:25-28)

In the third week of July Christians from area churches will gather together to reach out to community members in need through the 5th annual Mission Trip Birdsboro. Mission Trip Birdsboro is a local project intended to provide needed home repairs and maintenance to area homeowners who are unable to undertake the repairs or maintenance themselves. Many of the residents are elderly and cannot manage the home repair issues they face. Others simply do not have the resources needed to handle a problem with their home. Over a hundred volunteers from churches such as ours will bring their variety of skills and energy to the tasks in over 60 local residences.

The project results in substantial improvements in the lives of those involved. Homeowners receive valuable assistance in the maintenance of their homes. In some cases such assistance helps people, particularly low-income elderly residents, to remain in their homes. In other cases, families struggling financially, for a variety of reasons, are given vital support.

One element of this program should be lifted up. Mission Trip Birdsboro seeks to create a powerful sense of community among all its participants. Throughout the project volunteers are prepared to interact with homeowners in a positive and Christ-centered way. Religious leaders (including myself) serve as "listeners" who meet with volunteer teams and homeowners to hear their stories and check in about how things are going. In the evenings, when the work for the day is done, a service of worship helps volunteers relate their experiences with the mission being carried out on behalf of Christ.

On the last day of the project, Sunday, there is a large celebration meal. This meal is attended by volunteers and homeowners alike. It gives all the participants an opportunity to recognize and celebrate the work God has carried out in their midst. It is also an opportunity to acknowledge the powerful sense of community established through the project.

We live in an era characterized by breakdowns in community. The social media "communities" on the internet, which were supposed to connect people together, have driven them further apart. People barely know their neighbors let alone interacting with them. Too often we are self-segregating by where we live, the things we choose to do and our association groups into enclaves encountering only people "like ourselves." In this time, it is vitally important to bring people together in genuine communities that open us to those we might not normally encounter.

Jesus himself went about seeking out people not a regular part of his "circle." He encouraged his disciples to realize that it is not God's intention that people cut themselves off from people they perceive to be different than themselves. Jesus broke down divisions and based his sense of community on the principle outlined in the parable of the Good Samaritan. It is God's will that our interaction be conditioned by the transaction of care and concern between a giver and a receiver. In the interaction both are enriched and that is the foundation of Godly community.

I believe Mission Trip Birdsboro is a modern parable of community happening in our midst.

THOUGHTS ON A RAINY DAY by Joy Gerhart.....



It has been so rainy that you would be hard pressed to guess on which day I wrote this article. I'm sure that along with me you have been horrified to see the scenes of flooding and devastation in parts of the U.S. this spring and summer. (It amazes me that we were just in Houston last summer!). Water is so powerful! It can give life and also take life. Our bodies are mostly comprised of water. We need to continue to hydrate ourselves to stay healthy. Baptism with water is our sacrament of entry into the Christian community. Though we are so dependent on water, we seem to have a love/hate relationship with it. We seem to either have too little or too much –never just enough.

This makes me think about the Israelites in the wilderness with Moses. God gave them water and manna (their daily bread), and when they complained about being tired of that, God sent them meat. (I became acquainted with an amazing passage in the Bible in the book of Numbers about what God said about the quail, the meat God sent the

Israelites. In Exodus 16:4-5, after the people murmured about starving, God said "I will rain bread from heaven for you; and the people shall go out and gather a day's portion every day, that I may prove them, whether they will walk in my law or not." (Verse 5 is about gathering double the amount on the sixth day to observe the sabbath on the 7th day.) Also the LORD said to Moses in Exodus 16:12, "At twilight you shall eat flesh and in the morning you shall be filled with bread; then you shall know that I am the LORD your God." I quoted all this to contrast with the passages in NUMBERS 11: "The people of Israel also wept again, and said, 'O that we had meat to eat! We remember the fish we ate in Egypt for nothing, the cucumbers, the melons, the leeks, the onions, and the garlic, but now our strength is dried up and there is nothing at all but this manna to look at.' . . . (verse 4-6) and God's reply through Moses, "Therefore the LORD will give you meat, and you shall eat. You shall not eat for one day, or two days, or five days, or ten days, or twenty days, but a whole month-- until it comes out of your nostrils and becomes loathsome to you-- because you have rejected the LORD who is among you, and have wailed before him ..." (verses 18-20) God sounds a bit angry, don't you think?

Maybe it's human nature that we are never satisfied. Maybe it's a result of that sin that holds us captive. Maybe we are only at the beginning of our journey to learn to trust in God. Don't get me wrong—I feel like we've had more than enough rain, too! However, I'd like to try to stay positive and accept the blessing of water. I like the image in Psalm 1 of trees planted by streams of water, who I picture as not having to worry (as if trees worry) because they always have enough water. God is with us, and we have enough. This is Psalm 1:1-3 (and don't get hung up on the word "law" which also means instruction/commandments/salvation/decrees/promise/covenant):

Happy are those who do not follow the advice of the wicked,
or take the path that sinners tread, or sit in the seat of scoffers;
but their delight is in the law of the LORD,
and on his law they meditate day and night.
They are like trees planted by streams of water,
which yield their fruit in due season,
and their leaves do not wither.
In all that they do, they prosper.

Highlights from Assembly 2019

Festival Worship

On Saturday, June 1, approximately 500 delegates and visitors gathered at Genetti Ballrooms Inn & Suites in Hazleton for Assembly 2019. The day began with a Festival Worship Service led by Bishop Zeiser and synod Vice-President Kristen Edelman-Weiner. Service music was provided by Deacon Michael Krentz and a volunteer choir. An offering of \$3,600 was collected for World Hunger.



In his sermon, **Bishop Zeiser** spoke of a "stirring" within us when we recognize the active presence of God in our life. Driven by faith, we become convinced that we "are onto something"; and we then are

compelled to see it through. The result is ministry, ministry built on the generations of Christians who likewise were convinced that they were onto something. However, the past, no matter how great, is sometimes unhelpful for this time. Our theme "Freed in Christ for a New Day" reminds us that it is indeed a new time; and it further reminds us of who it is that got us here, and who will come again.

ELCA Churchwide Representative



The **Rev. Ronald T. Gluskamp**, Director for "Always Being made new: The Campaign for the ELCA," was this year's ELCA Churchwide representative. Pastor Gluskamp described the ELCA Churchwide ministry and mission in 2018. This included major efforts in advocacy, candidacy, congregational vitality, Fund for Leaders, World Hunger, global mission, and the Youth Gathering. Gluskamp's presentation, an offering of over \$3,300 was collected for The Campaign for the ELCA.

Bishop Zeiser's Report to the Synod

Bishop Zeiser reviewed some of the mission and ministry of our Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod during the past year. He then talked about challenges that the next bishop (to be elected at Assembly 2020) will face. He emphasized that many congregations will be facing challenging situations; and that it is critically important for both congregations and rostered ministers to commit to building a collegial relationship with the new bishop and his or her staff as together they face the immense challenges to come.

After the morning session, the delegates and visitors adjourned for a luncheon in recognition of the 50th anniversary of the Synod receiving its charter. They enjoyed their meal under a large tent on a beautiful spring afternoon.

Reports from Synod Officers

The Assembly heard reports from the synod officers:

Vice President Kristen Edelman-Weiner; Secretary The Rev. Carl Shankweiler; and Treasurer Donald Dillman. The 2020 Spending Plan was adopted with a total budget for next year of \$1,984,400, of which \$869,500 is sent to the ELCA for Mission Support; and \$148,000 is given to various church related institutions such as Bear Creek Camp, United Lutheran Seminary, Muhlenberg College, PA Conference of Churches, and LAMPa.

Resolutions

The Assembly adopted two resolutions. The first was a major revision of "Continuing Resolutions" offered by Synod Council to bring them up to date with current practice. The second was a resolution that the Youth, Young Adult, and Family Ministry Team address the need for synodical youth leadership; and that this Team work with the Transition Team that will report to the new bishop in 2020.

The 2020 compensation guidelines for pastors and deacons were also adopted.
