**JANUARY, 2020**

The ancient people of Northern European climes were well familiar with the challenge posed by the month of January. For Europeans in antiquity this month was a dark time, a starving time. The Anglo-Saxon name for January was *Wulfmonath*, "month of wolves." Normally shying away from human contact, the barrenness of the landscape forced hungry wolves out of the woods and into human villages where they sniffed at shuttered windows and slinked down village paths hoping to find or make a meal.

*Wulfmonath* is an awesome name for a month but we ended up with the Roman month name January. January is named after the very ancient Roman god Janus; Roman god of portals and doorways, endings and beginnings. Janus is always depicted as having two faces; one facing forward and one facing behind. Janus gazes into the past and was the guardian of history while simultaneously looking forward into the future. Janus personified time itself. It was Janus who woke the sun in the morning and rolled back the stars and Janus who brought the day to a close. As the guardian of beginnings Janus appeared on Roman thresholds and as the author of endings his visage was etched on Roman graves. Watch closely at New Years and you may still catch a glimpse of Janus behind the libations and resolution making.

Christians are not devotees of Janus or any of the Roman pantheon. (obviously?) But this does not mean the Christian God is not habitually portrayed as being two faced. Too often the descriptions of God on offer put forward a Janus like very two-faced God. God's one face is wrathful, judgmental, threatening and violent. The other face, the face of Jesus, is merciful, loving, gracious and nurturing.

Early Christians, like Christians today, struggled with how to reconcile the "two-faced" God they found in scripture with their monotheistic principle that there is but one God. Some Greek Jesus devotees suggested perhaps there really was two gods, a creator god of the Old Testament; moody and violent and the graceful god shown through Jesus. These early Christians were called Gnostic Christians.

Other Christians affirmed that there was only one God, the God represented by Jesus Christ, and any other depiction of God was a hoax which should be expunged from the Bible. One of these Christians, a second century bishop's kid named Marcion of Sinope decided that the Old Testament was a fraud and should be gotten rid of. He also jettisoned most of the New Testament except for the Gospel of Luke and select letters from St. Paul. The "Marcion Crisis" forced the early church to make a definitive statement about what books should be officially recognized in the Bible; something which had not yet been officially decided.

Marcion was wrong to see no consistency between the God of the Old Testament and the God of the New but I can understand his confusion. If we might expect anything at all from an omnipotent all-powerful God, we should expect consistency, but the God frequently encountered in the Old Testament and sometimes in the New can be perplexing in light of how God is revealed to us in Jesus Christ. We can never know the inner workings of God, but we are directed to find God fully disclosed and incarnated in Jesus. For us, there is only one face of God and it is the grace-filled, loving, forgiving, peaceful, benevolent God taught and embodied by Jesus.

The God revealed by Jesus is passionate about justice and grieved by human sinfulness, yet tireless in calling God's children to return to God's fold. This God prepares a place for all people and calls all people to embody this same gracious hospitality. The God of Jesus Christ is entirely consistent, authentic, singular. We must not be followers of a two-faced God. Jesus Christ is the face of God which God has chosen to reveal to us. If we discover another face of God, even in Scripture a face not revealed in Jesus, it is the face of Jesus to which we return.

Fortunately, the benevolent face of God is as demonstrable in the Old Testament as in the New Testament. The graciousness of God has been God's continence always facing in one direction, toward us.

This January we give a nod to, but turn away from the two-faced Janus and reaffirm our commitment to the one faced God revealed in Jesus Christ. And we affirm our faith under the blessing of the Old Testament benediction, *The Lord bless you and keep you; the Lord make his FACE shine on you and be gracious to you; the Lord turn his FACE toward you and give you peace. (Numbers 6:24-26)*

**THOUGHTS ABOUT EPIPHANY.....**by Joy Gerhart

When I think of the season of Epiphany, I think of “seeing the light.” As I write this, I am looking to find some light at the end of the tunnel of the Christmas season. Christmas can get so busy and so full of expectations that we can't always enjoy it. We are drawn away from the true meaning, the miracle of Jesus' birth, the thought that God would even be willing to come to us as a human, enfleshed like us and willingly holding back divine powers. Epiphany is about seeing the light, seeing the star the wise men followed, and seeing the light that reveals Jesus as God's son. The Merriam-Webster dictionary defines epiphany as 1) a usually sudden manifestation or perception of the essential nature or meaning of something, 2) an intuitive grasp of reality through something, 3) an illuminating discovery. We sing the hymn with the refrain: “God in Christ made manifest.” We read gospel passages that

“shed Light” on who Jesus is. When I think of Epiphany, I think of the old Ford commercial where a light bulb turns on in someone’s head and they say, “Now I get it.”

Epiphany may be a time when we can “reflect” on passages about Jesus and ponder the miraculous event we celebrated at Christmas.

Hopefully this is a season when we feel less pressure and can breathe a little. (Maybe we will even be able to see more clearly in 2020!) We need to recognize that even when we put away our electric lights and candles, the light of Christ is still with us, every day, and is always present to illuminate our path and guide us. ## Open Arms Senior Connection - Arndt's, Easton



For over 17 years, grants totaling more than a half million dollars have been made possible through mission support giving. Grant applications are received by the Witness and Service Ministry Team and are awarded based on the outreach the grant will accomplish.

The story that follows is written by the founders and the current program director of Open Arms Senior Connection. It tells of an inspiring ministry that got its beginning because of a vision, the need to help others, and the available grant funds that allowed it to thrive.

Over ten years ago a small Welcome and Outreach committee at Arndt's Lutheran Church in Forks Township was looking for another ministry that could use their resources. The congregation came together to modify their existing spaces using funds predominantly from a Transforming Congregations grant and a Witness and Service



grant, both of which are mission support grant programs available through the Synod.

Today "Open Arms Senior Connection" continues as a two-day a week program for older adults in the greater Easton community. Realizing that the time some of the participants spend at Open Arms might be the only times during the week that they enjoy a meal with someone, or have any human contact at all, inspires the congregation to make the program as effective and impactful as possible.

The success of this program is due in great part to two paid co-directors and all the volunteers. The program runs on a budget of about \$1000 per month, which goes toward daily beverages and snacks, basic supplies, and salaries.

Donations, fundraisers, and Witness and Service grants from the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod of the ELCA has allowed this program to reach and provide long term benefits to hundreds of older adults in the region.

## Sharing Life - St. Mark, Allentown



Sharing Life is the brain child of Sue Krasley, a parishioner of St. Mark's, who worked at Allentown State Hospital and who had concerns about individuals losing peer relationships due to the closure of the hospital in 2010. At the time, Pastor Brindjar graciously and enthusiastically afforded the opportunity to begin our mission by opening the doors of St. Mark's for a monthly gathering.

What originated as a modest idea of serving a monthly luncheon nine years ago has expanded into a much sought-after experience by our community; it now includes monthly Craft days led by St. Mark's talented artists Brenda Mann and Charlie Orbin.

As our events grew, our attendees have become diverse; and today, monthly events not only include individuals formerly served at Allentown State Hospital, but also embrace individuals with Intellectual Developmental Disabilities as well as the community at large.

Throughout the years the echo and sentiment of Pastor Brindjar's mantra can still be heard: "Stay Calm and Carry On". Due to the success of our mission, and because we often find ourselves serving upwards of 120 individuals each month, we have adopted another mantra: "fishes and loaves."

Because of St. Mark's willingness to take a risk and open their doors and hearts, our mission isn't just about serving individuals lunch. More important is offering to individuals our acceptance, an opportunity to form new friendships, and a welcome to a faith-based community. All activities and luncheons are free to participants and are funded lovingly by our mighty Committee members, St. Mark parishioners, and community donors.
