THE PASTOR'S MESSAGE.....

I led worship at a nursing home the other day. A bland statement under normal conditions for sure. But considering that such places were ground zero for the virus and sealed up tight for a year, I must admit going back was refreshing.

By the graciousness of God and with thanksgiving in our hearts we look forward to the eventual return of *normalcy* after more than a year of pandemic. We are not yet at *normalcy* and we must not become irresponsible as we near the finish line, but we have begun to, cautiously, expand our in-person worship format in anticipation of diminished Covid spread and wider dissemination of the vaccines. Since my full vaccination I have, as mentioned, returned to leading worship at nursing homes, had several weddings and baptisms and tried to reconnect to ministries which had become largely dormant over the last year.

Last Easter is etched in my mind; surrounded by the beautiful Easter flowers I looked out at an empty sanctuary and led our virtual worship with a heavy heart. I know this year is not a sudden return to normal, it cannot be, but at least it will not be last year.

We have planned our Holy Week and Easter worship services with the intention of full inclusion of the congregation in person or at home. To this end we are sending home worship materials for the Three Days Services and Easter including communion supplies for your household to commune at one of the communion services over those days. The

Triduum/Easter worship folder is for your use at home or if you are coming to in person worship bring it with you. If you need additional communion supplies for your household just call the church office and we will arrange for you to get what you need.

There will be diverse opportunities for worship during Holy Week. These include in-person services, parking lot services and live-streaming. I urge you to consider carefully which worship options best align with your safety practice and worship needs. If you have any questions about worship opportunities or safety procedures do not hesitate to call me.

THOUGHTS ON COMING BACKby Joy Gerhart

We all have places where we feel safe, or at least I hope we do. I never stopped coming to the church office to work so that continued to feel safe for me. I remember the first trip I took to the post office after hours (actually it was the Mt. Penn post office which has a scale and an automatic stamp dispenser) to mail Sunday school materials to the children, wearing my mask and rubber gloves and having sanitizing wipes in my car. We didn’t know what was safe and what was not. We asked, “Do I need to wipe off all the boxes of food I got from the grocery store?” (I stayed away from the grocery store for 6 weeks!) How often should I wash my hands? I was lucky in that I didn’t have to worry about bringing the virus home to anybody, but I had to be careful not to be a carrier to anyone at the church. When would we be able to reopen the Child Development Center again? Then that was resolved. Church reopened cautiously with specific protocols, then closed before Christmas and recently reopened again. We’ve endured a whole year of changes.

Coming back is tough, tougher for some than for others. Now here's a big leap in thought: I wonder how it was for the ancient Hebrews in Babylon around 539 B.C. when they were told—now that the Babylonians had been conquered by the Persians—that they could go back to their homeland after over 40 years in exile. (I warned you.) I wonder how they felt. I wonder what they thought. We don't talk too much about the people who ventured back to Jerusalem after the exile. We read about this period of Jewish history in the books of Ezra and Nehemiah in the Bible. In Ezra we read that 42,360 exiles returned to Jerusalem, not including their 7,337 servants, 200 musicians, and thousands of animals. By the seventh month, the people were settled and built an altar to the God of Israel so they could burn sacrifices. You will remember that the Temple had been destroyed when the Babylonians conquered Jerusalem and deported thousands of people. The long arduous process of rebuilding the Temple then began. I was surprised that I didn't find anything about the people feeling sad about what they saw when they returned to the holy city—the broken-down walls and the burned gates of Jerusalem. We do, however, read that Nehemiah, an exiled Jew serving as a wine steward for the king of Persia IN Persia, DID weep and fasted for several days upon hearing of the conditions in Jerusalem. The Persian king, Artaxerxes, then sent Nehemiah back to Jerusalem in Judah to govern there.

What I find interesting is that while the people were in exile, many believe the synagogue "system" began. Before that, worship was temple-centered. Without the Temple, people had to devise another way to worship. Of course, we know the practice of gathering to worship at the synagogue has continued up through our present time. (I'm sure they have had to cope with closing and opening to be safe just as we have.) Imagine feeling you had to go to a distant city to worship. Synagogues may have been a very welcome innovation to many who wanted to continue in their faith in the fellowship of fellow believers. Perhaps that's the way some of you feel about our online services, even though the feeling of fellowship is still a little lacking.

Now I don't want any of you to think that I am drawing any comparison between the condition of the church building and the Temple in Jerusalem. Everything is ship shape here, and many of you have seen that from the live streams. This is just my attempt to understand that it is hard to come back when we have gone through such a scare and so

many changes. I believe it IS possible to come home again. Not everything has changed, but not everything has remained the same either. Some of that is for the good. We now have a beautiful audio-visual booth where all our technical equipment and wise operators reside. Not only that, but we plan to continue live streaming "forever." We have reached so many people miles and miles away who would not ordinarily worship with us. The technology has helped most of us remain in contact with each other.

Fortunately, we don't have to try to rebuild a Temple. Things are still in the midst of change. Our hopes of an end to this pandemic have grown stronger with the growing number of people who have been vaccinated. But we are still wearing masks and taking temperatures and using hand sanitizer and keeping our distance and taking pew reservations. (I wonder if we will have another ELCA Youth gathering with a possible 30,000 youth and adults again, so far scheduled for July 2022. That feels like a giant leap, too!) We just hope that when you feel comfortable, you will consider coming back.

Adult Class on Sunday Mornings...

Our last class on the series "Embracing the Prophets in Contemporary Culture" will take place on Sunday, March 28. (There will be no Adult Sunday School on Easter Sunday.) The following Sunday, April 11, we will begin a new series about the Book of Revelation. The guidebook for the study is written by Dr. Barbara Rossing who is a Lutheran pastor and professor of New Testament at the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago. She was recently our keynote speaker for the synod Learning Ministries Day. The study materials we will use were created for Presbyterian Women's Group studies. Dr. Barbara Rossing also wrote the book, *The Rapture Exposed: The Message of Hope in the Book of Revelation* which should give you an idea from the title on where she stands when it comes to doomsday messages in Revelation.
