THREE LITTLE WORDS

I suppose people could be forgiven their flippant cynicism. After two years of pandemic, the disruption of lives, cancelled events, chronic uncertainty, inflation, the dire climate reports, and now the human catastrophe unfolding in Ukraine we are reaching our limit. People have stopped expecting things to improve long term. Is it better not to get your hopes up so as not to be disappointed?

"Life's a bitch" has been a popular phrase eliciting the response"...and then you die." (Perhaps this phrase has been replaced by WTF!). A little too crass for me but I suppose this is the liturgy of our culture.

It is liturgical, isn't it? It is like a church call and response... someone says, "Life's a bitch!" and everyone knows the right response is "and then you die." I know it is meant to be funny and dismissive of misfortune but for some this has become the credo of their quiet desperation. This phrase suggests there is nothing to be done about misfortune, uncertainty, and sorrow. It is the way of this world. It subtly gives permission to be callous, pessimistic...numb.

This could have become the funeral liturgy of the Christian church. Consider for a moment if the last experience of Jesus by the disciples had been his betrayal, his unjust arrest, abuse, and execution. If there had been no Easter, I can easily imagine this phrase being the final call and response of the short-lived Jesus movement. Peter, while he and the other disciples packed up their stuff to go back to their dreary lives, turned and said, "Life's a bitch" to which the other disciples responded with a good-bye wave "and then you die!"

But this was not the fate of the Jesus movement; we have three other words to say to each other and those three words make all the difference. When we say, "He is risen...he is risen indeed!" we are saying the exact opposite of "Life's a bitch...and then you die." The indifferent destructiveness of death does not have the last word. Injustice and cruelty do not carry the day. The every man for himself attitude of a life without hope is rejected. God has acted decisively in favor of people who did not deserve it because God loves us despite ourselves.

The Easter liturgy begins with the words "He is risen...He is risen indeed" as a very intentional declaration that these are the words which will define our lives as Christians. But simply saying these words is not enough. If we are to be Easter people we must live out our credo of hope contained within our Easter dialog and reject "Life's a bitch..." futility. Our actions as individuals and a community of faith must embody the expectation that God will bring blessings through us and that our individual lives should carry those blessing out into the world. Because Christ is raised, hope can never be extinguished and if it has become obscured, we must shine a light on it.

In a world where people dare not hope lest they face disappointment, those who follow Jesus have something to say, "He is risen!", the grave was not his end, the worst the world had to offer could not cancel God's love in Jesus Christ, that love is victorious.

The phrase "Life's a bitch" simply isn't funny anymore. Honestly, I don't think it ever was. What our exhausted communities, divided nation and fractured world need more than ever is the transformational power of three other little words "He is risen!" and it needs to hear these words in the lived witness of an Easter people. Only then might our weary friends and neighbors dare to hope and respond, "He is risen indeed!"

THOUGHTS...by Joy Gerhart

I have been mulling over the words to the hymn "Build A Longer Table" ever since we sang it on Sunday, Feb. 20 in church. The words are new but written to fit the tune of Noel Nouvelet which we know as the Hymn "Now the Green Blade Rises." The hymn is a new hymn for us in the new ELCA hymnal "All Creation Sings." I was impressed that the words were written by someone born in 1984.

Build a longer table, not a higher wall. Feeding those who hunger, making room for all. Feasting together, strangers turn to friend. Christ breaks walls to pieces, false divisions end.

Jesus and the prophets talk to us about righteousness and salvation. Amos 5:22-24 says, "Even though you offer me your burnt offerings and grain offerings, I will not accept them; and the offerings of well-being of your fatted animals I will not look upon. Take away from me the noise of

your songs; I will not listen to the melody of your harps. But let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an everflowing stream." Micah 6:8 says, "Will the LORD be pleased with thousands of rams, with ten thousands of rivers of oil? Shall I give my firstborn for my transgression, the fruit of my body for the sin of my soul?" He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the LORD require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" Jesus says, in Matthew 25:35-40" I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.' Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?' And the king will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.'

So what is righteousness and what is justice? It has to do with a right relationship with God and a right relationship with God's people, all people. How do we act this out? I think we are to build a longer table, make strangers into friends, feed the hungry, help the weak, shelter the homeless.

Build a safer refuge, not a larger jail. When the weak find shelter, mercy will not fail. For any place where justice is denied Christ will breach the jail wall freeing all inside.

The word "jail" makes me feel a little uncomfortable, but maybe that's what I need this Lent is things to think about that make me uncomfortable. There are MANY who are not free, who are metaphorically in jail. All oppression is a kind of jail.

Build a broader doorway, not a longer fence. Love protects all people, sparing no expense. When we embrace compassion more than fear, Christ tears down our fences, we are welcome here. "Broader doorway," "sparing no expense," and "embrace compassion more than fear" are the phrases that jump out at me. How often do we narrow the doorway to others in many subtle ways, refuse to sacrifice or spare no expense, or cave to fear when we need compassion?

When we lived as exiles, refugees abroad, Christ became our doorway to the reign of God. So must our tables welcome those who roam. None can be excluded; all must find a home.

We are hearing about refugees every day. The early Hebrews were refugees and exiles. We may not personally know what it really means to be a refugee, but we are going to be needed more and more to support refugees. What does it mean to us that Christ became our doorway to the Kingdom of God, God's reign? I believe God's kingdom comes when God's will is done. And what is God's will? "To do justice, love kindness and walk humbly with your God." It's not easy. We will probably fail more than we will succeed. But we must try. I must try. I think this song helps me see this call a little more concretely. I will keep thinking about these words and try to live them. There are some beautiful recordings of this music with videos on line.
